



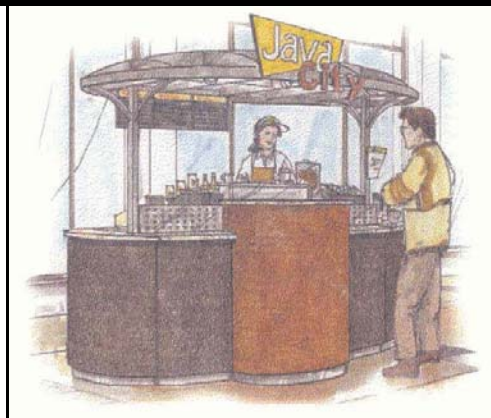
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## Java City Coming to Stapleton Library

## DOCUTEK E-Reserve Comes to IUP

With the start of the Summer Session I classes, the staff in the Circulation/Reserve department of Stapleton Library began the implementation of a new electronic reserve system. DOCUTEK is an online E-Reserve product whose one purpose is to help libraries and faculty take full advantage of the opportunities afforded by rapid advancements in technology.

And with all advancements come new methods of doing things or in the case of DOCUTEK E-Reserve, new guidelines for faculty for the submittal of course materials. First and foremost are clean, first-generation, single-sided copies. Faculty have been asked to review previously submitted materials and re-submit as needed.

Another feature of DOCUTEK is password protection. Students will access their course materials using a password specific to that course. Faculty are expected to supply the password to their students, although help

is available to those who may have misplaced their syllabus or forgotten the password. They may stop at either the Circulation Services desk or at the Reference desk.

And finally, faculty are now able to download the updated Reserve submittal form from the Library homepage. Under Library Areas, click on "Reserve", select "Reserve Form" [in the pane], fill in your information, print it and submit with your materials. It's as simple as that.

Moving on at rapid speed, E-Reserve is proving to be one of the most popular services the library offers and the enthusiastic acceptance of E-Reserve over the last several semesters is proof that it's a program whose time has come. The Circulation Services staff is poised and ready for a busy and productive Fall semester.

## New Microform Collection

One of the largest collections in the Stapleton Library is the microform collection. It consists of more than 863,000 volumes totaling over 1.75 million pieces of fiche, film and cards. We have books, serials, and government documents on microform that can be important to many fields of research. Book titles include **The Pollard and Redgrave Collection** [Early English Books Pre-1641], **The Wing Collection** [Early English Books 1641-1700], and the **Gerritsen Women's History Collection**, to name a few. Government sources available here are the **American Statistics Index**, the **Congressional Information Service**, and **Census** information. We have a complete collection of **ERIC** documents for educational research. Our microform serials include standards like **Time** and **Newsweek**, and many scholarly journals supporting IUP fields of study. **The American Periodical series, 1850-1900** is also available. The collection contains many newspaper titles: **The New York Times** from 1851 and **The Indiana Gazette**, just to name our most used titles.

Due to the technology money made available from the Board of Governor's Instructional Equipment Fund

in Spring, 2002, the Serials Department of the IUP Libraries has increased the number of machines that are available for public use to access these important microform collections.

In addition to our three current microfilm readers we have added five new mechanized microfilm readers bringing the total number to eight. The number of microfiche readers continues at eight. We also have one ultra-fiche reader for special-sized microfiche.

We have added two new Canon Microprint 400 machines where microfilm or fiche can be read or sent to a printer. Thus our micro-printing machines now number six. A new laser printer is linked to these two new machines by an A/B switch.

Two microfilm reader/printers that were servicing the branch campuses had to be retired, since parts were no longer available to repair them. Thus two of the older machines from main campus have been sent to the branches to provide access there, too.

Please note that the charge for printing microforms has been raised to \$.25 per copy.

The Serials staff is available to show individuals or classes how to use both the new and old machines.

## New Remote CD Rom Service

IUP Libraries has recently installed a new service, which allows web access to CD Rom applications and data. This service utilizes Microsoft's Terminal Services solution to provide fast access to a remote CD Rom server. The applications actually run on a high speed, high capacity server and your computer acts as the server's monitor and input (keyboard and mouse). Only control information and screen updates are transmitted allowing this service to run on older equipment providing it has Internet access along with Internet Explorer (recommended) or Netscape.
